The creation of the Coalition for Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans (CIAV) has made it possible for over 50 organizations to strengthen services and advocacy for active duty, veterans, families, and survivors. This relationship has also led to networking and joint efforts by many of the agencies. Air Compassion for Veterans is one non-profit that has greatly helped the work of fellow Coalition organizations.

Since November 2006, Air Compassion for Veterans (ACV) has flown over 8,200 flights with over 388 being for Coalition for Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans (CIAV) organizations.

Their Financial Development and Public Outreach Director, Heidi Greer-Davis comments, "Air Compassion for Veterans is proud to be a part of the CIAV and its collective

veteran organizations serving our wounded warriors and adversely affected family members."

ACV has provided flights for CIAV organizations including: The Coming Home Project, Fisher House, Injured Marine Semper Fi Fund, IAVA, Operation Homefront, Our Military Kids, Project Return to Work, TAPS, USA Cares, The Pathway Home, and Vets4Vets.

Abel Moreno, the Community Development Director of Vets4Vets credits ACV's assistance as invaluable. He says, "Their support has enabled us to fly more than 80% of our veterans to peer support workshops in the last year. It is collaborative efforts such as these that show the true heart of a strong coalition."
